Possibly - the Executive Order states: This declaration will provide licensing boards the authority to waive professional licensure requirements, which will support Arizona in maintaining a robust healthcare workforce. Arizona has a <u>statute</u> establishing certain exemptions for licensure including "A person who resides outside of this state and who is currently licensed or certified to practice psychology at the independent level by a licensing jurisdiction of the United States or Canada if the activities and services conducted in this state are within the psychologist's customary area of practice, do not exceed twenty days per year and are not otherwise in violation of this chapter and the client or patient, public or consumer is informed of the limited nature of these activities and services and that the psychologist is not licensed in this state. A person may exceed the twenty-day limitation requirement of this paragraph to assist in public service that is related to a disaster as acknowledged by the board."

We have statutory and regulatory provisions in place for emergency temporary registrations to provide services gratuitously. That information is available on the home page of our website: www.lsbep.org. An individual must obtain full licensure or a fully vetted (non-emergency) temporary registration to charge fees for services. Yes, any individual who is licensed or registered in Louisiana may provide psychological services to the citizens of Louisiana. Telepsychology does require licensure, but does not currently require a special certification. It is expected that regardless of the mode of delivery of services, psychologists practice within the limits of their competencies and in accordance with any statutory and regulatory requirements, including adherence to the ethics code; and in accordance with guidelines and best practice guidelines adopted by the board.

The temporary period shall not exceed ten consecutive business days in any period of ninety days, nor in the aggregate exceed fifteen business days in any nine-month period;

The NJ Governor did declare a state of emergency earlier this week. N/A Yes. The law allows for an exemption for individuals who hold a valid license, in good standing, in other jurisdictions to practice temporarily for a period not to exceed 90 days. This permission extends for no more than 10 consecutive business days or no more than 15 days within that 90-day period. This request must come before us before any out-of-state licensee engages in the provision of services. Individuals can submit such a request directly to the Board at this address: State Board of Psychological Examiners, PO Box 45017, Newark, NJ 07101. To consider the request we need to see a letter of request outlining the type of practice, a copy of resume or curriculum vitae, and a copy of their current out-of-state license. Those employed by settings regulated by the Office of Mental Hygiene To do telepractice must be licensed by NYS, meet the confidentiality requirements, send a report of service to a particular person, and use certain insurance designations.

We also have a courtesy registry that allows for 15 (and up to 30) days of telepsychology or in person psychology (requires appropriate liability insurance and full registration with no sanctions in home province).

Prince Edward Island Psychologists Regulation Board	Phone: (902) 566-0549 Website: <u>Click here</u>	Update from Prince Edward Island as of, 16 March: During the time of the COVID-19 health crisis, psychologists registered in jurisdictions outside of Atlantic Canada (and who are not eligible for practice into PEI as part of the Atlantic Telepsychology MOU) who are continuing, or renewing, a professional relationship with a client who has moved to PEI are eligible for a "Special Certificate" permitting telepsychology practice into PEI with that client. The "Special Certificate" will be granted upon simple notification to the PEIPRB Registrar with the psychologist's contact information and home jurisdiction registration number; no application form or fee is required.

It is the determination of the RI Board of Psychology that a RI licensed psychologist may practice Tele-Health in RI as Tele-Health is considered to be within the scope of practice for psychologists. RI also allows a psychologist licensed in another state to practice in RI for 10 days per calendar year, per RI General Law (RIGL) 5-44-23 (h) in RI. At this time the Board would consider contact by a psychologist licensed in another state with a patient physically located in RI as 1 day counted toward that limit. Associated with this provision, a psychologist licensed and physically located in another state may practice Tele-Health from their home state to a patient / client physically located in RI. The provisions of this chapter do not apply to the following persons: (4) Persons who are not residents of this state, and who have not established offices in this state, who render psychological services in this state for a period which does not exceed an aggregate of more than twenty days during any one year, if they are authorized under the laws of the state or country of their residence to perform these activities and services. If a provider exceeds ten consecutive days of practice in this state in any calendar year the provider shall report to the board, in writing, the nature and extent of the provider's practice in this state;
