

The Ethics of Procedure: Fact & Folly

This one-day virtual conference addresses professionalism at both a macro and micro level for all professions working with couples and families in the court system. We will discuss potential implicit biases that could hijack our best intentions in serving our clients, how to address those biases with professionalism and integrity. Professional guidelines will be presented in a fresh perspective to complement our current approaches while leading us toward better practices in light of new reflections. Further discussions will be held on the new statute allowing 12-year-old children to seek out their own therapists without consult with their parents. We will discuss the intention of the change and analyze how this affects family law professionals. The use of conflict resolution as a problem solver through perspective change, positive outcomes, and awareness of the needs of the individual as well as the whole will help experts naturally guide the parties toward clarity, and hopefully resolution. Finally, a spokesperson from attorney regulation will assist us all, including non-lawyers, in maintaining ethical and professional approaches when dealing with these difficult cases. The intent of the day is to provide a blend of experts and their approaches to support the ethical integrity and professionalism for all family law professionals.
