Legal Custody

- **Description:** Authority to make significant decisions regarding the child's upbringing

Joint Legal Custody

- Alternate names: shared legal custody, shared parental decision-making
- Example: Both parents collaborate on making significant decisions in the child's life
- Pros: Important choices are made with input from both parents
- Cons: Conflicts and delays, which can create serious problems in emergencies

Types of Child Custody Cheat Sheet

Physical Custody

- Description: Authority to make significant decisions regarding the child's upbringing
- Examples: Primary residence with one parent, shared time between both
- Alternate names: Parenting time, time-sharing, visitation

Sole Physical Custody

- Description: One parent has primary responsibility for the child's day-to-day care

- Alternate names: Full physical custody, primary physical custody, basic shared
- Example: Child primarily resides with one parent under a 70/30 or 80/20 schedule
- Pros: Stability and routine for the child, clear caregiving responsibility
- Cons: Limits time with non-custodial parent, potential for strained relationships.

Joint Physical Custody

- Description: Child spends significant time with both parents
- Alternate names: Shared physical custody, shared parenting time
- Example: 50/50 parenting schedule where the child spends equal time in both homes
- Pros: Child maintains strong bonds with both parents, shared caregiving
- Cons: Requires effective coordination and cooperation, logistical challenges
